Be it remembered that before the Probate Court in and for said County, holders at the Court House in the Town of Bowling Green in said County, on the third day of January, 1853, personally appeared in open Court Moses Hendrick a resident of said County who being duly sworn doth on his oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provisions made by the act of Congress passed July 1st 1848 and other acts - that he is Administrator of the Estate of Nancy Hendrick deceased - that she was a Pensioner of the United States at the rate of Eighty Dollars per year under the act of July 1838 and Supplementary acts - that he makes this application for the purpose of obtaining for himself and Melley Maiden, Patsy James, Wesley Hendrick and Johnson Hendrick the only surviving Children of said Nancy Hendrick, the difference between sixty Six Dollars and Eighty Dollars a year up to the date of the widows death to which he understands her to have been entitled - that she was a widow at the time of her death.

On this 14th day of August 1829 before me, the subscriber, one of the Judges of the ~~Circuit~~ *Circuit* for the said ~~district~~ *Circuit*, personally appeared *Elijah Hendrick* aged 62 years, resident in *The County of Prince Georges* in the said ~~district~~ *Circuit*, who, being by me first duly sworn, according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain the provision made by the late act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary war:" That he, the said *Elijah*

Hendrick enlisted for the term of *two years* on the *7* day of *March* in the year *1776* in *Half of Camp* in the state of *Virginia* in the company commanded by Captain *Mathew Copp* of the Regiment commanded by Colonel *McClary* in the line of the State of *Virginia* on the Continental Establishment; that he continued to serve in the said corps, or in the service of the United States, ~~until~~ *and that a little*

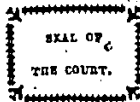
before the term, when he was discharged from service in *the account of* that enlistment *he again enlisted in* *the account of* *that enlistment* *commanded by* *Colo Morgan* *for the term of* *three years* *and continued in* *service as above - until the said period had expired - when he was discharged* *in Williamsburg in Virginia - that he was in the battle of the Clouds* *of Virginia - at the Battle of Monmouth - he was in the battle of Clouds* *and that he is in reduced circumstances, and stands in need of the assistance of his country for support, and that he has no other evidence now in his power of his said services.*

David Todd Judge, &c. as aforesaid, do certify that it appears, to my satisfaction, that the said *Elijah Hendrick* did serve in the revolutionary war, as stated in the preceding declaration, against the common enemy, for the term of *nine months* at one time, on the continental establishment. I am also satisfied that he needs the assistance of his country for support. And I now transmit the proceedings and testimony taken and had before me, to the Secretary for the Department of War, pursuant to the directions of the aforementioned act of Congress. I further certify that he made a previous declaration on the *15th* day of *Aug.* *1819* or thereabouts -

ber in the year of Our Lord 1821, personally ap-
peared in open Court being the Circuit Court
Court of Record within & for the said County of
Pike, Elijah Hendrick ^{resident} a ^{citizen} of said County
aged sixty four years, who being first duly sworn ac-
cording to law, doth upon his oath make the
following declaration, in order to obtain the pro-
visions made by the Acts of the Congress of the
United States passed on the 18th March 1818, and the
1st May 1820. that he the said Elijah Hendrick
enlisted & served on the Continental establishment
from the 7th March 1776 to the month of July
1781. by virtue of two enlistments, the one for
the Term of two years & the other for three years
to the best of his recollection in the following
manner - that is to say - on the 7th March 1776
he enlisted for two years, (in the County of Halifax
in the State of Virginia) in the Company com-
manded by Captain Nathaniel Gackle, & went to
old Williamsburgh, where the said Company
joined the 7th Virginia Regiment commanded
by Col. M. Steuart; that he was at Governor's
Island at the driving away Gov. Dunmore;
that he afterwards marched to New Jersey and
joined Gen. Washington's army at Bond Brook;
that he afterwards joined the Company com-
manded by Capt. Thomas Poffey in Morgan's
Rifle Regiment, under whose command he
marched to Canada, was at the taking of Gen.

Burgoyne & at the battle of Monmouth, that he was
under the command of Gen. Sullivan in his In-
dian expedition; that on his ^{return} he joined the company
of Capt. William Mosely, in the first Virginia Reg-
iment commanded by Russell & Ball in Gen.
Woodford's Brigade, marched to Charlestown
South Carolina & was there taken prisoner - and
remained there until the month of July in
the year 1781. when he was exchanged & sent home
to Old James Town & thence went to old Wil-
hamsburgh where he was discharged - & that of
these facts he has no other evidence in his pow-
er, at this time, than the word of a Continen-
tal Soldier, under the solemnity of an oath -
sworn to & subscribed in open Court, 12th Nov. 1820, at the Court of the
State of Virginia, in the County of Stafford, in the presence of the first
County of Stafford, in the presence of the first

of May 1820. I do solemnly swear that I was a
resident citizen of the United States, on the 18th day
of March, 1818; and that I have not since that
time, by gift, sale, or in any other manner, dis-
posed of any property or any part thereof, with
intent so to diminish the same, as to bring my-
self within the provisions of an act of Congress
entitled "An act to provide for certain persons
engaged in the land & naval service of the United
States, in the Revolutionary War," passed on the
18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not
nor has any person in trust for me, any prop-
erty, securities, contracts, or debts due to me, nor
have I any income, other than what is contained
in the schedule hereunto annexed & by me
subscribed - that is to say -

(Schedule) One cow, one pair, one pot, one kettle,
one axe & one hoe, I am by occupation
a farmer and have my wife Nancy & one
son, Moses, living with me; myself & wife
are neither able to manage for ourselves
my wife is sixty two years of age, & we are
both infirm. I of worn out constitution,
my son Moses is, and ever has been of a
weakly habit, entirely unable to render any
assistance

The County of On this 29th day of May, one thousand Eight Hundred and forty four before the subscriber one of the Judges of the County Court in and for the County and State aforesaid the same being a Court of Record and so declared by the Law creating it, personally appeared Nancy Hendrick a resident of said County aged Eighty three years who being first duly sworn according to Law doth on her oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed July the 4th 1838 Entitled an act granting half pay and pensions to certain widows that she is the widow of Elijah Hendrick who was a private in the army of the revolution That she is not able to state the particulars as to his services but refers thereto to the original Declaration of her said husband on file in the proper office in Washington City That her said husband was a pensioner on the Pension Roll of Missouri at the rate of Sixty six Dollars per annum She further Declares that she was married to the said Elijah Hendrick in the County of Charlotte in the state of Virginia on the 27th day ^{of October} in the year one thousand seven hundred and Eighty five and that her maiden name was Nancy Harrison and that she was married by License That her husband the aforesaid Elijah Hendrick died on the 11th day of September one thousand Eight hundred and thirty That she was not married to him prior to his leaving the service but the marriage took place before the first of January one thousand seven hundred and thirty four So wit at the time before mentioned

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your request for information in regard to Elijah Hendricks, a Revolutionary War soldier from Virginia.

The data which follow were obtained from papers on file in the pension claim, W.10104, based upon the military service of the only Elijah Hendrick, searched under all spellings, that is found in the Revolutionary War records of this office. He signed in person as Elijah Hendrick.

He was born June 23, 1758. The place of his birth and the names of his parents were not given.

He enlisted in Halifax County, Virginia, March 7, 1776, and served as private, corporal, sergeant and quartermaster sergeant in Captains Nathaniel Cocke's, Thomas Posey's and William Mosseley's companies in Colonel McClanahan's, Morgan's, Ball's and Russell's Virginia regiments; he was in the battle of Gwyn's Island, at the capture of Burgoyne, in the battle of Monmouth, in Sullivan's Indian expedition, was in the siege of Charleston where he was captured and held prisoner until July, 1781, when he was exchanged.

He was allowed pension on his application executed August 14, 1820, at which time he was a resident of Pike County, Missouri.

He died September 11, 1830.

He married in Charlotte County, Virginia, October 27, 1785, Ann or Nancy Harrison, who was born February 9, 1761.

As the widow of Elijah Hondrick, Nancy Hondrick was allowed pension on her application executed May 23, 1844, at which time she was a resident of Pike County, Missouri.

She died in said county June 13, 1852.

Elijah and Nancy Hondrick had the following children:

Moses Hondrick married September 15, 1829, Amanda who was born November 28, 1809, her maiden name not given. Their children were Mary Ann born October 14, 1830, and Hannah Louisa born June 27, 1833.
